NEISE activity reporting



Dr. John Cranmer, DNP, MPH, MSN, ANP-BC is an Assistant Professor in the Woodruff School of Nursing. John's implementation research focuses on collaborative approaches for addressing adverse health outcomes in low and middle income countries (LMICs) with a particular focus on maternal survival, community-clinic collaboration and cohesive clinician teamwork. His recent work focuses on designing a novel model for measuring emergency obstetric capacity in global health systems and an intuitive tool for rapidly measuring and improving clinical teamwork at facilities.
